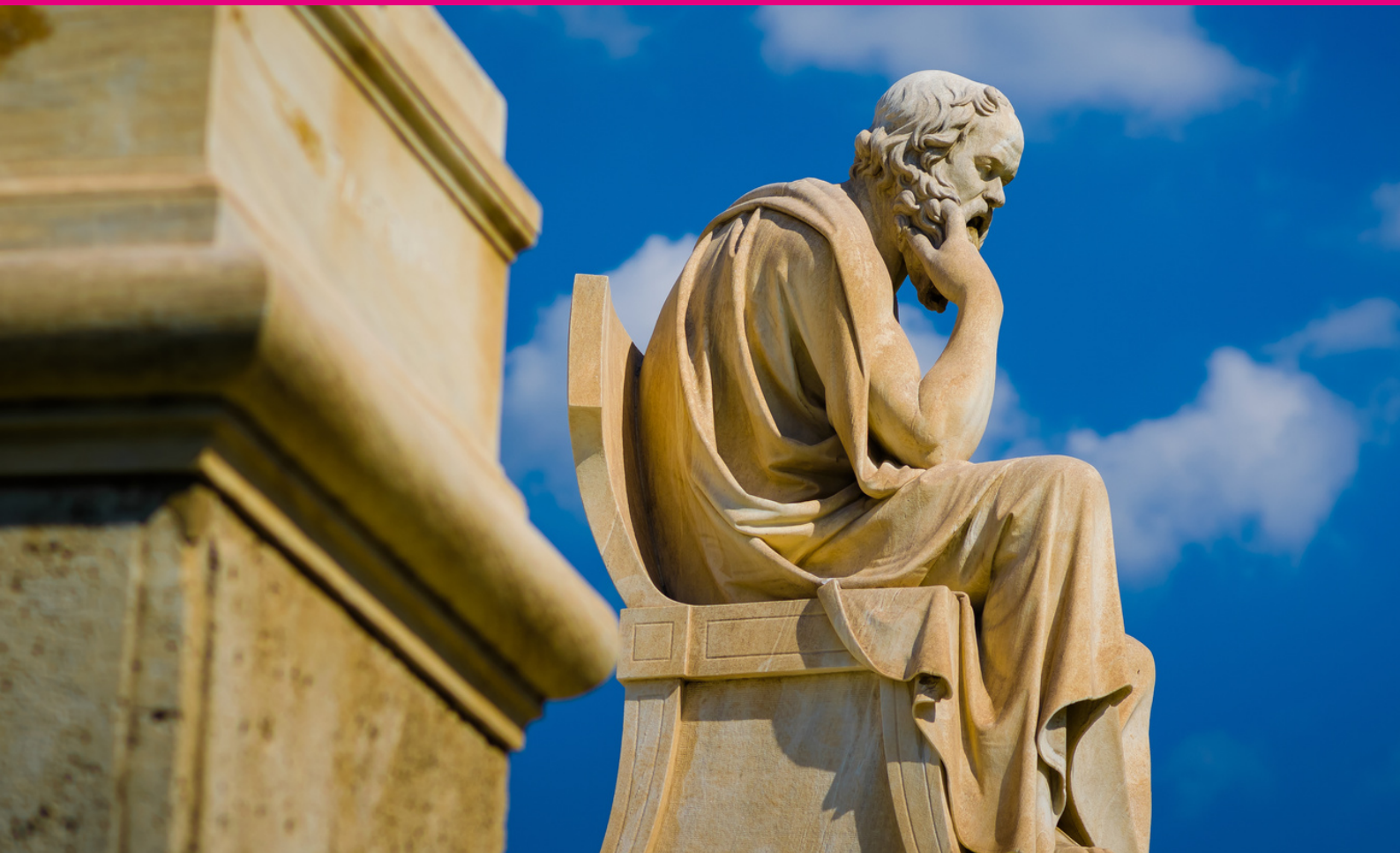

Subject Overview

What is Philosophy?

In any field of study, it is too difficult to describe what it actually is in a single statement. This is particularly the case with philosophy. Derived from two Greek words, *philia* (love) and *sophia* (wisdom), the term philosophy literally means 'the love of wisdom'. In its most basic sense, philosophy is simply the quest for understanding the world, and everything in it. It is concerned with "big questions" about the nature of the World, human existence, time, space, the cosmos, moral ideas, political aspirations, education, love, death, the law, religion and the meaning of life.

Why Study Philosophy?

Well, one reason is that it's very interesting. It introduces students to an amazing world of ideas and theories reformist and conservative, religious and secular, East and West, ancient and modern, mainstream and minority. In addition, because of its unique emphasis on clarity, argumentation, and critical evaluation, the study of philosophy can:

- Develop your power of reasoning
- Improve your ability to critique the view of others
- Teach you to get to the heart of an issue, and to distinguish it from less important matters

- Clarify and improve your communication skills, both written and spoken
- Help you to organise your thoughts rationally and to present them in a clear, coherent manner
- Develop skills that are widely transferable to other areas of study and to the professional world outside of university.
