Aim- to enhance participants' capacity to incorporate sexual health promotion into their work through developing their comfort levels, confidence, knowledge and skills in relation to sexual health.

Target audience- health, education, youth and community professionals seeking to integrate sexual health promotion into their core work

What is the FPSHP?

Content

- Day 1 Introduction to the FPSHP / Establishing the group
- Day 2 Sexual health promotion in the Irish context/ Sex, gender & sexual orientation
- Day 3 Sexual health- a life course approach/ Healthy relationships & sexual pleasure
- Day 4 Broader issues around sexual health promotion-values, self esteem & law
- Day 5 Sexual & reproductive health-fertility, contraception, STIs
- Day 6 Working safely around sexual health

Methodology

- Based on adult learning and experiential learning theory
- Stimulus activity, paired/small group/ individual reflection, group processing.

The Story of the FPSHP



2009

Foundation Programme in Sexual Health Promotion Timeline of evolution from regional to national programme

Observed need: short topic focussed courses weren't enough to build capacity and 2007 confidence for professionals to incorporate sexual health promotion into their core work.

2008 **Feasibility study:** 702 questionnaires to staff and 59 questionnaires were sent to management across HSE departments and NGOs. Responses: 159 staff /19 managers

2008 **Development of the HSE South Sexual Health Promotion Training Policy:** based on Recommended Quality Standards for Sexual Health Training 2007'-UK DoH 2007

2008-09 Development of FPSHP programme and evaluation process

1st programme delivery in SE and SW: (3 x 10 day programmes over the 2009)



Timeline of evolution from regional to national programme

1st internal academic evaluation: An Elucidation of the Informal Programme
Theory Underpinning the Foundation Programme in Sexual Health Promotion
(based on initial 2 deliveries of the programme in 2009)

2013 1st external academic evaluation (TCD): Capacity Building Impact of the Foundation Programme in Sexual Health Promotion: A Multiple Stakeholder Perspective (based on 12 deliveries of the programme 2009-2012)



2016 2nd external academic evaluation (TCD): The Development and Piloting of the Sexual Health Promotion Education Evaluation Tool (SH-PET)-3 point evaluation tool (3 deliveries in Kerry, Waterford and Dublin)



Timeline of evolution from regional to national programme

2016 Completion of FPSHP manual and appointment of a National Co-Ordinator to enable the national roll-out (action under the National Sexual Health Strategy 2015-2020)

2019 SHCPP evaluation of the FPSHP as it rolled out nationally, *An Evaluation of the HSE's Foundation Programme in Sexual Health Promotion Training for Professionals* 2016-2018



2024 Redeveloped FPSHP commenced delivery- new 6 day version of the FPSHP programme rolled-out

2024 Current situation- approximately 13 programme deliveries p.a. across the country. Health Strategy



Development Process

Importance of

- identifying the need
- focussing on capacity-building rather than training
- building the case/ finding influential champions amongst decision-makers to move things along at various stages
- establishing a committed working group
- developing quality standards to guide all aspects of the programme development and implementation
- basing the format, content and methodology (theory-based) on national and international research and experienced practitioner knowledge and practice.
- developing an evaluation process as a part of the initial course development
- obtaining CPD accreditation for a number of key organisations.



Lessons learned

Implementation process

Importance of:

- Developing of a detailed FPSHP manual -to enable the required level of programme fidelity in a national roll-out
- Appointing a national co-ordinator- to act as a hub of information and support to facilitators
- Building facilitator capacity- through a clear induction pathway/ ongoing peer-networking and CPD opportunities
- Using a structured participant recruitment process- this should be proportionate to programme duration & necessary commitment, including pre-course interviews
- Providing ongoing support to ex-participants- to enable them to incorporate sexual health promotion into their work



Lessons learned

Overall learning:

- The lack of professionals' comfort and confidence is a bigger barrier to implementing sexual health promotion initiatives, than a lack of knowledge.
- Having a well researched, evidence-informed, rigorously evaluated, manualised programme allowed for sustained national roll-out.
- The national roll out of the FPSHP has generated a ecosystem in which many generic health promotion officers have been enabled to develop a sexual health promotion specialism. This has led to other sexual health promotion initiatives regionally.
