Background

- National Sexual Health Strategy¹ aim: "equitable, accessible and high quality sexual health services, which are targeted and tailored to need, will be available to everyone."
- STI notifications have been increasing in Ireland over the last 10 years².
- Survey of STIs and contraception services in Ireland (2018) showed inequity in access to public STI services³.
- Online services can overcome barriers to testing, such as embarrassment, difficulty travelling or obtaining an appointment.
- A pilot conducted in 2021, found that the home STI testing service was feasible, impactful, and acceptable to service users and providers (SHCPP 2022)⁴.

Establishing a national service

- Funding secured in budget 2022.
- Contract awarded to online provider SH:24 following an EU tender procurement process.
- The national service was launched in October 2022.
- Service is available to people aged 17 and older living in the Republic of Ireland.
- Service users are tested for chlamydia, gonorrhoea, syphilis, and HIV, with some users offered hepatitis B and C testing as required.
- Service is integrated with public STI clinics as a referral pathway for reactive results.









User journey



User visits SH:24.ie

• Complete demographic, triage and safeguarding questions. Users are recommended STI test kit based on their sex and sexual history



User completes sample collection at home



User posts samples back to lab

Prepaid return envelope provided



Results sent to user by SMS*

- Reactive results referred for confirmation testing or treatment as required, clinical support provided
- Those with reactive *HIV/hepatitis are called by clinical team



Service objectives and targets

Objectives

- Improve STI testing capacity and equitable access to testing across Ireland
- Shift individuals with less complex sexual health needs to an online platform
- Promote self-management through online access to sexual health information, services and support

Targets

- Provide 10,000 home STI test kits per month, of which:
 - >75% would be returned to the laboratory for processing
 - >95% of users would receive their results within 72hrs of samples reaching the laboratory





Home testing service data




The home testing service accounted for **48% of chlamydia** notifications and **29% of gonohorroea** notifications in Ireland in 2024.

Gender identity

- 57% female (incl. trans female)
- 41% male (incl. trans male)
- 1% prefer not to say
- 0.8% non-binary
- 0.2% other

gbMSM users

- 14.4% (14,640) gbMSM users
- 23.7% using PrEP
- 46.3% hep B vaccinated
- 33% had condomless sex in past 5 days
 - 73% not on PrEP



Safeguarding


- 2,304 (2.3%) adults reported having experienced a sexual assault
 - > Offered information, support and signposted to relevant services

- 721 orders from 17 year olds. 211 (29%) raised safeguarding flags:
 - > Depression, pressured, bribed/paid for sex, partner age, drink/drugs
 - Follow up by SH:24 safeguarding team.





2024 service evaluations



User feedback

- Easy, convenient, quick, inclusive
- Discreet, private, free, reliable
- Good communication, clear instructions
- Users have the most difficulty with blood collection and taking an adequate volume.




Service developments and initiatives

Interval STI testing for stable PrEP users

- **V**
- **SH:24 user accounts** enables users to see their order history and results from orders placed through their account
- **Kit redesign** over 80% reduction in plastic kits and components to be more environmentally friendly and recyclable
- Online management of low complexity chlamydia rolled out on a permanent basis, following a successful pilot in 2023
- Offer of condoms and lubricant to gay, bisexual and other men who have sex with men (gbMSM) within their test kit orders

 ✓
- **Piloting user activated kits** available at a range of community based settings where users do not wish to have kit sent to their address underway











Online management of low complexity chlamydia

Individuals with a positive chlamydia result can opt to have their treatment prescriptions sent to their local community pharmacy, reducing the number of individuals who need to attend a face to face service

Commenced on a permanent basis since July 2024

Opt-in condoms and lubricant in gbMSM test kits

From Oct 2024, gbMSM using the home STI testing service are offered the option of ordering condoms and lubricant with their test kits

 Other users are signposted to NGO postal services to access free condoms and lube on <u>sexualwellbeing.ie/freecondoms</u>

User activated kits



- In 2025, SHP and SH:24 began piloting user activated kits with 4 community partners
- Test kits are available from community partner venues/ outreach services and are activated at home via a QR code.



- Upon scanning the QR code the user is brought to the same SH:24 secure online platform to progress through the online demographic and risk assessment.
- A limited selection of STI test kits are available to community partners, appropriate for their key target population groups (gbMSM, trans people, sex workers etc).









Conclusions



- We are meeting the service objectives and targets
- The service has been successful in reducing barriers and improving access to STI testing and diagnosis in Ireland
- The service has been well received especially by young people, and provides users with timely access to STI testing and their results
- The service continues to develop and innovate, and we are looking forward to an exciting year 4!

Next steps

- Continue to improve access to PrEP piloting a hybrid digital/f2f PrEP pathway underway
- Improving OOH access to PEP, discussions ongoing with Emergency Medicine Programme
